The sliding doors for the conference room and office are vintage garage doors from a home in South Georgia. The majority of the furniture was handcrafted by local artist Justin King of JK Concrete Design through collaborative design with Mehrnush. Buying local and supporting small business is equally as important to Blue Ink Title as being part of a community.

Blue Ink Title hopes to stand out, not only in their office design aesthetic, but in their business model as well. It strives to be a small firm that the local community can readily access. They want their clients to drop in for a cup of coffee and a chat, to call with any kind of questions, and to share in each other's success.

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What to Do With Leaves and Other Yard Waste

Fall is coming, and that means leaves on the ground lots and lots of them. You could rake them and bag them for pickup by the City as part of your weekly garbage and recycling collection. Leaves are considered "yard trimmings," along with grass clippings, pine straw, brush, shrub and tree plantings, tree roots, and tree branches.

There are some restrictions, however:

- You must use a paper bag made specifically for this purpose. (They won't take plastic bags.)
- Bags must weigh less than 35 pounds.
- Branches can't be longer than 4 feet or wider than 6 inches across.

If you use a professional landscaping or lawn maintenance company, they should take any leaves, trimmings, or debris with them.

Another option is composting, a way of speeding up the normal decay process to recycle nature's resources. Compost is basically decomposed organic material, and it makes a rich soil additive for your garden. Healthy soil means you'll need less chemical fertilizers for your plants.

"I've been composting leaves and yard waste in my backyard for years," says Susan Rutherford, planning division manager for the City of Atlanta Department of Watershed Management. "Composting has a ton of benefits. It maintains the natural cycle of replenishing nutrients to your soil, it keeps leaves from clogging our streets and storm drains, and best of all — no leaf bags to buy or fill!"

You can compost yard trimmings, coffee grounds and filters, shredded papers, eggshells, and food waste — but not meat.

To get you started, the City of Atlanta offers workshops on composting with an educational presentation followed by a hands-on demonstration of composting barrels. The last one for 2016 is this month, and space is filling fast!

One More Place to Park Your Bike

The newest addition to Kirkwood's bicycle infrastructure is a replica gas pump bike rack, designed to complement the historic filling station that Stryant Construction remodeled in 2014. It was fabricated by Kirkwood resident and local welder Ben Vass of Vass Metal Works.



The practical sculpture was made possible by a \$250 matching fund grant program Kirkwood Neighbors' Organization (KNO) has set up that matches any local business in getting an artistic yet functional bike rack installed.

The new rack joins the existing Dero FixIt stand, bike corral, and numerous hoop racks around the downtown business district.

What's "Neighborly" When It Comes to Suspicious Persons?

Have you ever been locked out of your house because you lost your house keys? Or better yet, have you walked out of your house and closed the door behind you, only to remember that you left your keys on the table?

I know, it probably happened when you were a child or a teenager. What did you do? Did you anxiously call a relative? Some of you may have reluctantly called a locksmith. Still others may have tried to find an open window to crawl through.

For those of you who tried to crawl through an open window of your home, have you ever had the police called on you? Frustrating, isn't it?

Whether you were new to the neighborhood, or visiting a relative who had to go to work or had lived in the neighborhood a long time, having the police question you about your actions only compounded the situation. You were probably looking around, while the police were questioning you, trying to figure out, who called the police?

Who Is My Neighbor?

I was eating dinner at Anna's BBQ one evening, listening to patrons talking about who they knew and what was going on with them. What I overheard was, even though there were times in Kirkwood's past when the crime rate was high, there was a communal feeling among those who live(d) here. Everybody knew — or at least knew of — everybody.

Since the turn of this century, or just



prior to, a lot of new people have moved into Kirkwood, and that includes me. One of the things that I noticed about the residents in Kirkwood when I moved here was that a lot of people were very active on social media. I also noticed that some of the social media posts were rooted in fear, evidenced by the many "Be On the Lookout" (BOLO) posts.

However, over the four years that I have attended the Kirkwood Neighbors' Organization (KNO) meetings, the reports from the Zone 6 precinct officers do not match the voluminous social media posts about suspicious persons in the neighborhood. I personally found it disturbing that Atlanta police officers requested that they be called if you see a suspicious person.

As a resident of Kirkwood, I do not feel that calling the police should be the first response when you see a suspicious person. The "suspicious person" may have permission from the property owner to be there, like a friend or relative house sitting. That suspicious person is someone that you do not know, but do you really know your neighbors well enough to know all of their friends and relatives?

The Ask

I am asking the residents of Kirkwood to spend less time on the neighborhood social media sites reporting suspicious persons and more time getting to know their next-door neighbors or the neighbors across the street.

Here is what I proposed at the August 2016 KNO meeting:

1) Greet the person: Just say hello. Do not question them. (Again, the person may have permission to be there).

2) Call the homeowner or renter if you think the person is suspicious. (This means that you have to get to know your neighbor in order to get their phone number.)

3) If you cannot reach the homeowner or renter, go to the neighbor's house. (The neighbor probably already knows the person that you think is suspicious.)

4) If all else fails, then call the police.

I believe that this neighbor-friendly approach to suspicious persons is indicative of the values of "Southern hospitality" and will continue to foster a communal sense in Kirkwood.

Trail to Neighborhoods and BeltLine Could Happen



The map *above* (from the PATH Foundation's interactive Trolley Trail map) shows two trails, near Coan and Gilliam parks. They were built before the Centennial Olympics on of the right-of-way of the Atlanta-Decatur trolley line that ran from Cabbagetown through Kirkwood to Agnes Scott College.

The map at **right** shows additional proposed sections to connect the existing pieces and extend the trail through Edgewood to Reynoldstown and the Eastside BeltLine.

Kirkwood could get a pedestrian- and bicycle-friendly link to the BeltLine, if Atlanta voters approve a new 0.4¢ sales tax on Nov. 8. The City's list of transportation-related projects funded by the \$300 million in expected revenue includes some smaller, neighborhood trail projects — the East Side Trolley Greenway among them — along with big-ticket items such as street and sidewalk improvements.

The TSPLOST would go into effect on April 1, 2017, and last for five years.
