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# 5K and Fun Run to benefit elementary school

FATE is an amazing place of learning that serves more than 500 children in the East Lake, Edgewood, and Kirkwood neighborhoods. The Title I school has dedicated and passionate administrative and teaching staff as well as an active parent body, strong community partnerships, and a campus retrofitted to accommodate students with a range of physical abilities.

Funds raised through the Race for FATE will directly benefit the school through the FATE Foundation's Staff Grant Program and also advocacy work such as the Realtor Tour co-hosted with the GO Team earlier this year.

The 5K chip-timed event starts at 8:00 AM. The route goes through Edgewood and Kirkwood, with water and food stations along the way. It's \$30 for

A recently added benefit of membership at the not-forprofit East Lake Family YMCA is Parents' Morning Out (PMO), which began Sept. 4 for its first fall season. This program, for Y members only, allows a parent who is usually caring for a child age 2-4 at home to run errands, take care of business, or just have a few moments during the day to themselves. For a monthly fee, parents can sign up for two days each week, Monday/Wednesday or Tuesday/Thursday.

It's more than just babysitting. The program, led by YMCA professional childcare staff, offers arts and crafts activities, story time, supervised free play, and basic early learning skills development (shapes, colors, counting, and socialization). There also will be monthly seasonal and holiday themes. The Monday/Wednesday pair will also include swimming lessons in the indoor pool.

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# How can meditation be a high-performance tool?

As a meditation teacher, I meet people every day who have preconceived notions about meditation. People assume that we have to sit in an uncomfortable position with our backs straight and legs crossed, that we have to clear our minds of thoughts, and maybe even that we need to be hippies with flowing hair, meditating in a grassy field with birds chirping and rainbows. Most people understand that meditation can help with stress management, and maybe even with anxiety and insomnia.

But do you know that meditation is also used as a high-performance tool? CEOs, doctors, attorneys,

professional athletes - think Phil Jackson and the Seattle Seahawks - and artists, of all political and religious backgrounds, use meditation because it simply makes them better at what they do.

First, meditation activates the right side of the brain, which connects with intuition and instincts. That voice is often a whisper and can be drowned out by the loud inner critic, which immediately follows it.

You know that voice. It's the one that says, "You don't have the right skills. You aren't good enough. Everyone will laugh at you. You won't make enough money ....." That voice comes from the left side of our brain, which

is concerned more with our individuality and maintaining the status quo.

When we activate the right side of our brain by meditating regularly, we turn *up* the volume on our intuition, making it easier to pursue an exciting or creative idea.

Second, meditation takes us out of survival mode. When we're constantly stressed out, we're using all our available energy and brain power to survive, not thrive. When we're singularly focused on trying to make it through the

next hour, day, or week, we don't have the ability to step back and make strategic and creative decisions that will benefit our professional and personal lives.

Meditation gives our minds and bodies a break from stress chemicals like cortisol and adrenaline, and it bathes our brains in serotonin, endorphins, and other "bliss" chemicals, ultimately making us less focused on survival and more adaptable, creative, efficient and strategic. Meditation sharpens our senses and increases our simultaneity, the ability to do more than one thing at the same time.

Conscious health meditation breaks free from meditation stereotypes. It can be done anywhere - even in offices, cars, coffee shops, and airplanes. And for anyone feeling bored, dissatisfied, or trapped, it's the easiest way to make lasting changes and begin to thrive.
