

Historic walking tours

If you've been meaning to learn more about neighborhood history, or if you have out-of-town guests to entertain, consider a Battle of Atlanta Commemoration Organization (BATL) walking tour. They also offer a nice alternative to watching football on television or holiday shopping. These easy walks take approximately two hours.

Both tours include a lot of neighborhood history from before and after the Battle of Atlanta. Some of that history is the reason why the battle took place in our neighborhoods and not somewhere else. This battle was important not only to the outcome of the war but also to the history of our country.

Nov. 25: Civil War to Civil Rights

The tour on the Sunday after Thanksgiving includes a Battle of Atlanta overview, covering the troop movements as well as a couple of the most important sites of the battle, as well as stories of some of the individuals who fought and died here. How did the Union nip the surprise attack in the bud? It was a fortuitous plan (for them), realized just in time right here in our neighborhood.

One hundred years later, another era of conflict brought history to our doorsteps. You'll hear about the people who struggled during this time as well.

Dec. 30, 1:30 PM: The Frontlines Tour

This goes along the frontlines and around East Atlanta Village, where some of the most intense fighting took place. On the Sunday before New Year's Day, you can hear the stories of the forces and individual soldiers from both sides that met there in battle.

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Urban Pie celebrates expansion with reopening party

Urban Pie began as a corner neighborhood pizza joint in 2006 and, much like the neighborhood, has grown and evolved over the past 12 years. On Oct. 21, the restaurant held its grand reopening.

Owner Lisa Curtis had a vision of providing Kirkwood's largest patio and showpiece bar, and that is now a reality. The recent renovation took the restaurant from 783 to 3,000 square feet, including expansions of both the dining area and patio as well as the addition of a horseshoe-shaped bar. And large-screen TVs are throughout.

Craft beer, wine, and signature cocktails complement the thin, crispy artisan pies and casual fare of salads, calzones, and wings. The cocktails were a huge hit at the event, especially



the Jackie O – a blend of Cathead honeysuckle vodka, elderflower, cassis, citrus, and sparkling wine.

According to Curtis, their vegan pies have a cult following. The restaurant also offers gluten-free crust and keto-friendly crustless pizzas. Urban Pie offers food and

drink specials during the week, and on Sundays, you can listen to live acoustic music on the new covered patio.

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

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


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What's the issue with 911 emergency calls?

In Kirkwood, we are residents of both City of Atlanta and DeKalb County, which puts us in a unique position when calling 911 for emergency assistance. Fire and police services are routed through City of Atlanta, but EMS services are routed through DeKalb County.

When you call 911 from your cell phone, depending on which tower your phone picks up, your call can go to either the city or the county. The dispatcher answering your call is supposed to answer, ask for your address, and then ask what services you need (police, fire, or EMS).

If you need to be transferred – for example, if you're a Kirkwood resident whose call went to City of Atlanta but

you need EMS services from DeKalb County – the dispatcher is supposed to stay on the line until they connect you with a dispatcher from the appropriate 911 center and ensure your needs are met.

Being initially connected to the wrong dispatch center when you call 911 shouldn't be a problem. People all over the country have been dealing with this issue. At most, it should add an extra 10-20 seconds to your call.

Another option we have is to bypass the 911 system and directly call 404-658-6666. But it's only a good alternative if you're sure that you need City of Atlanta police or fire services.

And it's not a perfect solution. This number isn't entered in the 911 queue, so your call is less likely to be answered in a timely manner. This number doesn't offer the same location services

that 911 provides either. So, if you're outside your house or can't provide your address for some reason, the dispatcher won't be able to locate you.

The problem we have, in my opinion, lies with DeKalb County's 911 center. If there's ever an issue with a transfer or hold times, it's almost always on their side. During my time as chair of public safety for the KNO, we've had no response from or interaction with DeKalb County's 911 center, while the Atlanta Police Department's Captain Smythe has been very responsive and engaged.

We, as a neighborhood, need to push our county officials to address this issue.





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


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DIY: Restore the finish on your wooden front door

Our southern weather is not kind to wooden entry doors, especially original doors on historic homes. As the temperature finally cools off a little, many homeowners are considering sprucing up their front doors, in preparation for holiday visitors.

Let's look at what's involved in refinishing a wooden door. And a word of caution before you begin - it will be three to four days before you can securely lock the door again. Take this into account when you plan your project.

First, remove the door. Get a couple of sawhorses and pad them with towels. Then lay the door across them. Remove the hardware from the door.



Sand the flat portions of the door. A random orbital sander is a good choice, using 80-grit followed by 100- or 120-grit paper. Next, tackle the gunk that has collected in the corners, edges, and raised decorations

on the door with a small, sharp scraper. Be sure to pull the scraper with the grain, and be very careful to avoid gouging the wood.

Work on the profiles next. A door profile is the joint where the door panel and



the sticking come together. Use folded sandpaper or a sanding sponge to get into the profile, using long strokes over the length of the molding.

Clean away all the dust by brushing and then vacuuming the door. Now you're ready to seal the edges, before you stain and seal the whole thing. Leave the door on the sawhorses and give both the top and bottom edges a good coat of finish.

It's a good idea to put the door back on its hinges before you apply the stain. You can very easily damage the finish

on the door if you hang it after you're done with the refinishing. Do it now so you're more likely to end up with a perfect finish on the door.

What finish should you choose?

You can always paint the door – a practical and easy solution that will provide the longest protection against the sun and the weather. Use two coats of enamel over a primer.

But a beautiful stain or natural color followed with

> a clear finish will really set your door apart from its neighbors. Follow the staining directions to get the color you want, and then choose an appropriate

finish. Marine spar varnish is an excellent choice – it's tough and will stand up to

the sun.

After the first coat, let the door dry overnight before you close it completely.

Next, sand it with fine sandpaper (220 grit) – gently. You're not trying to get down to bare wood! Dust the door, then wipe it down with a tack cloth. Add a second coat of finish, and let it dry overnight again.

At this point, you're just one coat away from a fully refinished wood door. Sand the door once more with 220-grit sandpaper, then dust and wipe it down before applying the final finish coat.

When it's dry, reattach the door hardware and congratulate yourself!
